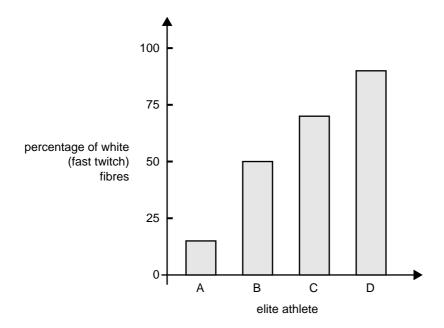

Muscle glycogen depletion in soccer

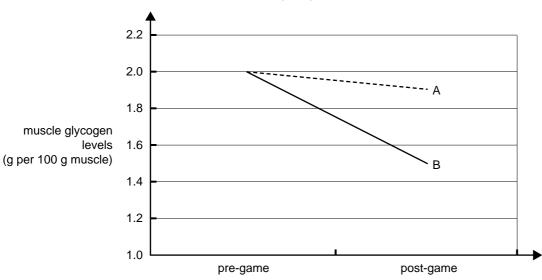

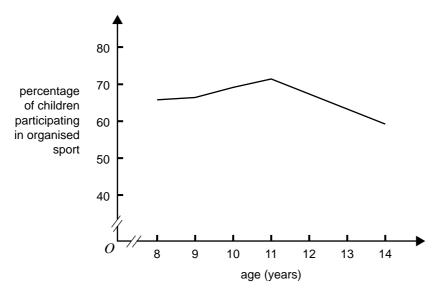

Relative energy supply during cycle exercise to exhaustion at 110% VO₂ max

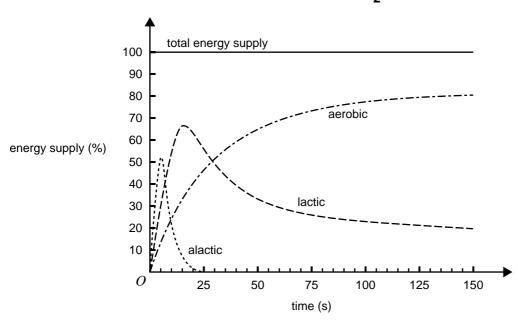

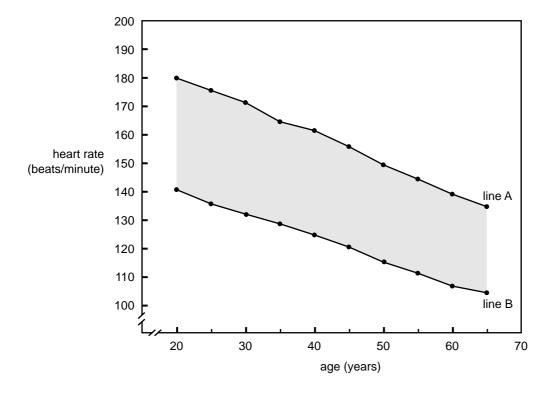

Effect of training on blood lactate concentration

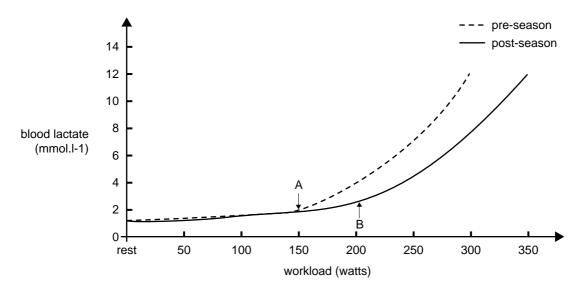

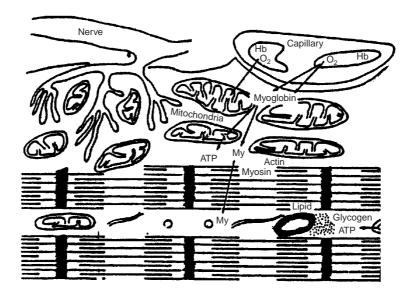
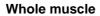

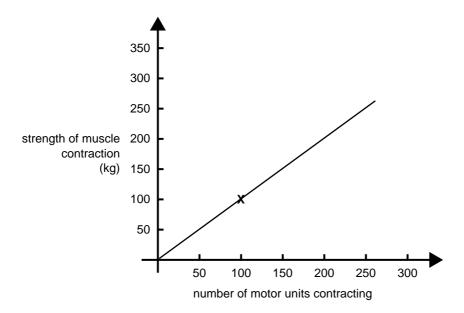
